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2	MR. ADLER: Good afternoon. Welcome to
3	the Teachers' Retirement System board meeting
4	for April 21, 2016.
5	Patricia, will you please call the roll?
6	MS. REILLY: Yes. John Adler?
7	MR. ADLER: I am here.
8	MS. REILLY: Thomas Brown?
9	MR. BROWN: Here.
10	MS. REILLY: David Kazansky?
11	MR. KAZANSKY: Here.
12	MS. REILLY: Sandra March?
13	MS. MARCH: Present.
14	MS. REILLY: Raymond Orlando?
15	MR. ORLANDO: I am also present.
16	MS. REILLY: Susannah Vickers?
17	MS. VICKERS: I am here.
18	MS. REILLY: We do have a quorum so we
19	can go on to the next item. All right. There
20	is an update on TRS operations. Each of you
21	should have received the latest calendar of
22	events, and we have a few updates from Ellen
23	DeLeo.
24	MS. DeLEO: TRS has started work on the
25	effort to notify members required to take a

1 minimum distribution in 2016. An estimated 2 3 24,350 members will be required to receive an RMD in 2016, including 2,850 first-time RMD 4 5 recipients. TRS was planning to begin the б mailing of RMD illustrations on April 26th for 7 associated members that have a domestic 8 partner as their sole beneficiary. We will be 9 including a letter advising them to inform TRS 10 if they are legally married as this may change 11 their RMD requirements. 12 Approximately 3,500 TDA deferral members 13 that are currently receiving their QPP 14 retirement allowance are making TDA loan 15 payments by check monthly. TRS will be 16 conducting a campaign to encourage these 17 members to have their loan payments deducted 18 directly from their QPP retirement allowance as a more convenient and secure option for 19 20 making their loan payments. 21 Preparations are underway to send out 22 the first quarter 2016 statements. The 23 mailing of quarterly account statements for

24 members currently in service or on leave is
25 expected to occur between May 2nd and May 9th

1 2 to an estimated population of approximately 3 121,000 members. Roughly 12,200 of these additional members have elected to review 4 their statements online only. Online posting 5 б of the TDA quarterly statements for 7 participants with TDA deferral status is 8 expected to begin on April 28th, concurrently 9 with statements being printed. The estimated 10 population is 51,000. Approximately 47,000 11 will be printed and mailed, and an additional 12 4,000 members have elected to review their 13 statements online only. Mailing of the TDA 14 quarterly statement for beneficiary 15 participants to an estimated population of 890 16 members is expected to occur on April 26th. 17 MS. REILLY: Thank you, Ellen. Next is 18 a report from the Actuary. MS. CHAN: Thank you, Patricia. 19 There 20 are two items on my list. The first one is 21 the final fiscal year 2016 contributions. There were no changes from the updated 22 23 preliminary fiscal year 2016 contributions that this Board adopted a few months ago in 24 January. The amount remains the same at 25

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3,702,569,102 dollars.

3 The other item on my agenda is the fiscal note report. There were seven fiscal 4 notes pertaining to the Teachers' Retirement 5 б System that was produced this past month. A 7 majority of the fiscal notes pertain to 8 military service. Each of these fiscal notes 9 are contained in a report that was distributed 10 to you, and if you have any questions, I will 11 be happy to take them at this time.

12 MR. ADLER: Any questions for Sherry? 13 Okay. And I think we are going to address the 14 resolution regarding the employer contribution 15 in the executive director's report.

16 MS. CHAN: Thank you.

17 MS. REILLY: Okay. So next is the 18 executive director's report, and it's been suggested that the next regular meeting of the 19 20 Teachers' Retirement Board be held on the 21 third Thursday of the month, May 26, 2016. 22 MR. ADLER: Any objection? 23 MS. REILLY: Any objection? Okay. You 24 also should have been provided with a board

25 calendar for the next fiscal year. So please

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2	review the calendar and get back to us if you
3	have any issues with the dates provided on the
4	handout, and then once we hear back from
5	everyone we will adopt that calendar next
6	time.

Okay. The motion carries. 10 11 MS. REILLY: Next is the adoption of 12 changes to the investment policy statements 13 relating to proxy voting for nonUS companies. 14 MS. MARCH: Move to the resolved, 15 please. MS. REILLY: "Resolved, that the Board 16 17 adopts the attached changes to the Investment 18 Policy Statement for the QPP and authorizes 19 corresponding changes to its TDA Investment 20 Policy Statement to authorize the 21 Comptroller's Office to vote nonUS proxies and 22 to make other conforming changes." 23 MR. 12	Whereas, Sandra March, trustee of the
13	Teachers' Retirement Board since 1984, is
14	retiring from city service after 54 years of
15	distinguished service to the people of the
16	City of New York and the members of the
17	Teachers' Retirement System, and whereas,
18	Sandra March began her teaching career in
19	District 26 in 1962, and whereas, Sandra March
20	has been a member of the United Federation of
21	Teachers since 1965, and has worked as a
22	chapter leader, legislative representative,
23	and pension consultant, as well as serving on
24	the union's delegate assembly, pension
25	committees, and executive board, and whereas,

2 Sandra March has received numerous awards for 3 her leadership and service on behalf of 4 members including the UFT's highest honor, 5 Charles Cogen Award and the Not For Ourselves б Alone Sandra Feldman Award, and whereas, 7 Sandra March has worked tirelessly in the 8 interest of in-service members and retired 9 members alike, working in the public arena to 10 protect and promote retirement security, and 11 as a teacher member of this Board to drive TRS 12 operations, and whereas, Sandra March has 13 dedicated her career to bettering the lives of TRS members as a group and as individuals, 14 demonstrating passion and fight, humor and 15 16 purpose, strength and vision. And whereas, 17 Sandra March has, in over 30 years on the 18 Board, inspired and influenced the staff of TRS who will miss her dedication, guidance, 19 20 and perhaps most of all, the wit, wisdom, and common sense of a first grade teacher. And 21 whereas, Sandra March throughout her career 22 23 was blessed to be able to draw on the love and support of her family, including her brother, 24 Ron and his wife, Marlene, her cousin Pauline 25

1 and her husband, Ira, and their children, 2 3 Karen and David and their spouses, Matt and 4 Lisette, and all the grandchildren who are the light of her life: Eli, Benny, Sandy, Julia, 5 б and Melissa. And therefore, be it resolved, 7 that the trustees of the Teachers' Retirement Board and the staff of TRS express deep 8 9 appreciation and gratitude to Sandra March. 10 We will sincerely miss her strong presence, 11 clear voice, and with great respect and 12 affection, we extend Sandy our best wishes for a wonderful and fulfilling retirement she 13 14 deserves. 15 (Applause.) 16 MR. AARONSON: Is there a second? 17 MS. MARCH: What I would like to say is 18 for 54 years, I have gotten up every morning and wanted to do my job. Whether it was with 19 20 the marvelous children in the school that I 21 taught or working for the UFT or for 32 years as a trustee, every day has been a challenge 22 23 and a delight, and I want to thank all of you for putting up with me. I always meant well. 24 I always cared the most about the membership, 25

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2	I have had a marvelous career and I wish the
3	next trustee, who will be elected very
4	shortly, I wish she has as good a career
5	working with the system as I have. Thank you.
6	(Applause.)
7	MR. ADLER: So is there a motion?
8	MR. KAZANSKY: So moved.
9	MR. ADLER: Is there a second?
10	MS. VICKERS: Second.
11	MR. ADLER: Any discussion? Okay. All
12	in favor of the motion recognizing Sandra
13	March, please say aye.
14	MR. BROWN: Aye.
15	MR. KAZANSKY: Aye.
16	MS. VICKERS: Aye.
17	MR. ORLANDO: Aye.
18	MR. ADLER: Any opposed? Any
19	abstentions? The motion carries.
20	(Applause.)
21	MR. ADLER: Okay. As long as we are on
22	the subject, I have a little thing to say too,
23	even though it's not part of the executive
24	director's report. And so that is that we
25	have a proclamation from the mayor which he

- 1 2 has asked me to read. I am going to try not 3 to repeat the stuff that was in the motion. 4 "Whereas, throughout its history, 5 New York has served as the center of the labor б movement and we are proud of the important 7 role that our residents played in fighting for 8 the reforms and increased rights that has 9 greatly benefited our city's outstanding 10 workforce throughout our history. 11 As the daughter of an electrician, 12 Sandra March grew up understanding the 13 significance of unions and the incredible 14 impact they can have on the lives of their 15 members and the communities those members 16 serve. Her passion for teaching and for 17 advocating not only for the rights of her 18 colleagues but for better education for students across the five boroughs and beyond 19 20 as well has made her an inspiration to us all. 21 I am honored to join in congratulating her on an impressive career as we come 22 23 together to celebrate her retirement. As you heard before, Sandra began her teaching career 24
 - in 1962 in Queens and quickly became an active

2 member of the United Federation of Teachers, 3 taking on the role of chapter leader of her 4 school in just three years. Asked by the long-time UFT President Al Shanker to become a 5 б legislative representative in Albany and work 7 with NYCERS, Sandy happily took on the role 8 helping teachers and unions alike. Sandy was 9 elected as a member of this board in 1984, and 10 was also a member of the UFT delegate assembly 11 and executive board as well as the UFT and 12 NYCERS pension committees.

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13 As a pension consultant, Sandy helped 14 ensure countless teachers received the 15 benefits they earned through years of service 16 to our students. Whereas, throughout her 17 tenure as an educator and UFT member, Sandy 18 has been steadfast in her belief that the members of this organization truly better the 19 20 lives of children across our city and beyond. 21 I proudly join in applauding all that she has achieved and after her many years of helping 22 23 others have happy and healthier retirements, I offer her nothing but best wishes for her own. 24 Now, therefore, I, Bill de Blasio, Mayor 25

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2	of the City of New York, do hereby proclaim
3	Thursday, April 21, 2016, the City of New York
4	as Sandra March Day."
5	(Applause.)
б	MR. ADLER: I am going to take a point
7	of personal privilege and just add some short
8	remarks about Sandy. I first met Sandy 15
9	years ago in 2001, and it was actually the
10	first pension issue that I got involved in
11	after I began my work with public pension
12	funds that year for the union that I worked
13	for, SEIU. And Sandy, when she heard that the
14	unionized janitors of the largest office
15	complex in Westchester County had been
16	terminated by a real estate manager that TRS
17	had recently agreed to give investment assets
18	to, she was livid and jumped into action, and
19	because the contract had not yet been signed,
20	Sandy, as well as Mel and Mona, convinced the
21	then-Comptroller, Billy Thompson, to pull that
22	contract and that resulted in those unionized
23	janitors getting their jobs back in
24	Westchester County and that was my first
25	exposure to Sandy March. And it really was

1 like a visceral demonstration of the power of 2 3 public pension funds to do good for workers. So I have had nothing but wonderful 4 5 experiences with Sandy ever since, and I have б to say that today really marks the end of an 7 era. I think as folks know that for many, 8 many years both I think predating, and 9 post-dating my introduction to them, it was 10 Mel, Mona, and Sandy. And after today, it 11 will no longer be Mel, Mona, and/or Sandy, and 12 I know that I am going to miss Sandy as well 13 as Mel and Mona in this role although I will 14 continue to count on their support as we move 15 forward. And of course, they are well replaced by Dave, Tom, and Debbie, and I am 16 17 looking forward to working with them as 18 productively as for me at least it's been working with Sandy, Mel, and Mona. 19 Thank you. 20 MS. MARCH: Thank you, John. 21 (Applause.) 22 MS. MARCH: I can assure you that David, 23 Tom, and Deborah will be Mel, Mona, and Sandy. 24 MS. REILLY: And John, just before we get to regular business, we do also have a 25

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2	beautiful plaque for Sandra, and it says,
3	"Presented to Sandra March in appreciation for
4	32 years of dedicated service, devotion, and
5	commitment to our organization. Your
б	dedication and your leadership will long be
7	remembered. The Teachers' Retirement System
8	of the City of New York April 21, 2016."
9	(Applause.)
10	MR. ADLER: So continuing with the
11	agenda, do we move to the calendar?

Page 15 is payroll 13 14 summary, accounts payable, new retirees, and 15 TDA accounts. Page 16 through 46, inclusive, are the transfer of active TDA deferred to 16 17 annuity payments. б	are going to come back into public session
7	afterwards because I know of at least one item
8	of business. Okay.
9	(Whereupon, the meeting went into Executive
10	Session.)
11	MR. ADLER: Back on public session,
12	please.
13	MS. VICKERS: And our last item has
14	arrived.
15	MS. MARCH: Have you ever been called
16	the last item before?
17	MR. STRINGER: Probably by you.
18	MR. ADLER: Welcome, Mr. Comptroller.
19	MR. STRINGER: Hello, everybody. It's
20	great to be here.
21	MS. VICKERS: Did you want to say a few
22	words?
23	MR. STRINGER: Oh, I want to say a few
24	words.
25	MS. MARCH: Am I allowed to rebut?

1 2 MR. STRINGER: I couldn't stop you. 3 MS. MARCH: We know that. MR. STRINGER: So I wanted -- I really 4 5 wanted to come here and present a proclamation б from the Comptroller's office to Sandy for her 7 amazing work protecting the teachers of the 8 city, and you know, sometimes when I present 9 these proclamations, I joke and people laugh 10 when we give them for different events, and 11 you know, when we say this is the moment you 12 have always been waiting for. Not the 13 Governor's proclamation, not the Mayor's proclamation, but you get the Comptroller's 14 15 proclamation. And people laugh politely. 16 Okay but this actually -- this proclamation 17 actually means a lot to you because you really 18 spent a lifetime working, training many of the Comptrollers of this city, and your philosophy 19 20 has -- as you have explained to me on the 21 phone -- was always about the teachers and the people you represent, and I think everybody 22 23 around the table knows that your passion has been a real retirement security and that you 24 have never let politicians or consultants or 25

2	mayors get in the way.
3	MS. MARCH: Even the president of the
4	UFT. Ask them. They will tell you.
5	MR. STRINGER: Yes. Many presidents.
6	And I think it's a real gift that TRS has, and
7	I actually don't know what I am going to do
8	without you because so much of what Susannah
9	and I talk about is you. And you all know it,
10	right? And so we are not recording this?
11	MR. ADLER: Live stream and we are
12	recording.
13	MR. STRINGER: So let me do this again.
14	On behalf of but lastly, I just want to say
15	to you since the moment we met and we
